Gospel: Mark 8:27-35

Jesus and his disciples left for the villages round Caesarea Philippi. On the way he put this question to his disciples, 'Who do people say I am?' And they told him. 'John the Baptist,' they said 'others Elijah; others again, one of the prophets.' 'But you,' he asked 'who do you say I am?' Peter spoke up and said to him, 'You are the Christ.' And he gave them strict orders not to tell anyone about him. And he began to teach them that the Son of Man was destined to suffer grievously, to be rejected by the elders and the chief priests and the scribes, and to be put to death, and after three days to rise again; and he said all this quite openly. Then, taking him aside, Peter started to remonstrate with him. But, turning and seeing his disciples, he rebuked Peter and said to him, 'Get behind me, Satan! Because the way you think is not God's way but man's.' He called the people and his disciples to him and said, 'If anyone wants to be a follower of mine, let him renounce himself and take up his cross and follow me. For anyone who wants to save his life will lose it; but anyone who loses his life for my sake, and for the sake of the gospel, will save it.'

#### Commentaries on Today's Readings

After listening to today's readings pause now to consider the following reflections:

#### From Rev. Robert Draper

It is worth noting that fifteen centuries before Luther the issue of the relationship between faith and works was an issue of concern to the early Church. Because of our familiarity with 'the Bible' as a single work it is easy to forget that it was unlikely that the writers of the New Testament had easy access to one another's writings. That means there is no reason to see a confrontation between Iames and Paul, though James is certainly challenging head on an interpretation of the Christian faith that he finds unacceptable. In his letters to the Galatians and the Romans, Paul has a lot to say about 'the works of the Law' and always in a negative sense. What he is criticizing is the belief that the ritual practices of the Jewish Law - especially circumcision and the food laws - are a necessary part of Christian observance. Indeed he quite rejects such an interpretation when applied to Christians of pagan birth. He insists that it is not the works of the Law in that sense that matter, but only faith in Jesus as Saviour and redeemer that makes one justified. For Paul that never meant that therefore 'anything goes' once we have faith. His letters are full of the condemnation of immoral actions, and full also of encouragement for living the moral life. But it must have been easy for some to pick up on certain aspects of Paul's teaching and adopt an attitude of 'once I have faith then I can do anything I like'. Such an attitude would have been anathema to the writer of the letter of James who is constantly insisting on the importance of practical Christianity. As James says, good works is the expression of faith, while with Paul it can also be argued that it is faith that enables the carrying out of good works.

#### And From Fr. Henry Wansbrough

This is the turning-point of Mark's gospel. Till now the stories we have heard have all spoken about ever-increasing wonder and amazement at Jesus' personality, his goodness and his authority. But even his closest disciples do not seem to have seen what this means. Then suddenly Peter comes to the realisation that Jesus is the Messiah, the Anointed of God, for whom everyone was waiting. However, Peter still does not understand what this implies. Jesus is not a conquering political hero, who will simply wipe out all opposition by overwhelming force, and make every path smooth and gentle. Jesus begins to show his disciples that the road to fulfilment is through suffering. Jesus repeats this prophecy of his suffering, death and resurrection another two times, and on each occasion the disciples fail to grasp the lesson; first it's Peter, then the disciples who are arguing about precedence, and finally the two sons of Zebedee who want the best places for themselves. So three times Jesus repeats that if you want to follow him you must follow him to the Cross. Nor are we, later followers of Jesus, any quicker that the first disciples to learn this lesson if we greet any suffering that comes our way with indignation and evasion. Why does Jesus rebuke Peter so fiercely?
