Jesus' teaching about not judging others.

First Reading 1 Samuel 26:2,7-9,11-13,22-23

Saul set off and went down to the wilderness of Ziph, accompanied by three thousand men chosen from Israel to search for David in the wilderness of Ziph. In the dark David and Abishai made their way towards the force, where they found Saul lying asleep inside the camp, his spear stuck in the ground beside his head, with Abner and the troops lying round him. Then Abishai said to David, 'Today God has put your enemy in your power; so now let me pin him to the ground with his own spear. Just one stroke! I will not need to strike him twice.' David answered Abishai, 'Do not kill him, for who can lift his hand against the Lord's anointed and be without guilt? The Lord forbid that I should raise my hand against the Lord's anointed! But now take the spear beside his head and the pitcher of water and let us go away.' David took the spear and the pitcher of water from beside Saul's head, and they made off. No one saw, no one knew, no one woke up; they were all asleep, for a deep sleep from the Lord had fallen on them. David crossed to the other side and halted on the top of the mountain a long way off; there was a wide space between them. He called out, 'Here is the king's spear. Let one of the soldiers come across and take it. The Lord repays everyone for his uprightness and loyalty. Today the Lord put you in my power, but I would not raise my hand against the Lord's anointed.'

Gospel Luke 6:27-38

Jesus said to his disciples: 'I say this to you who are listening: Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who treat you badly. To the man who slaps you on one cheek, present the other cheek too; to the man who takes your cloak from you, do not refuse your tunic. Give to everyone who asks you, and do not ask for your property back from the man who robs you. Treat others as you would like them to treat you. If you love those who love you, what thanks can you expect? Even sinners love those who love them. And if you do good to those who do good to you, what thanks can you expect? For even sinners do that much. And if you lend to those from whom you hope to receive, what thanks can you expect? Even sinners lend to sinners to get back the same amount. Instead, love your enemies and do good, and lend without any hope of return. You will have a great reward, and you will be sons of the Most High, for he himself is kind to the ungrateful and the wicked. 'Be compassionate as your Father is compassionate. Do not judge, and you will not be judged yourselves; do not condemn, and you will not be condemned yourselves; grant pardon, and you will be pardoned. Give, and there will be gifts for you: a full measure, pressed down, shaken together, and running over, will be poured into your lap; because the amount you measure out is the amount you will be given back.'

Memorial Acclamation

After listening to today's readings let us now consider the following reflections:

Fr Henry Wansbrough's reflection.

Luke's version of the Beatitudes, which formed last Sunday's reading, puts the emphasis not on Christian attitudes, as Matthew's version does, but on the blessing on those in real, dire need. Now he continues this with out duty to respond to those in need, even if they are hostile, even if they hate us. There must be no calculation whether we will get back money or property lent, no limit to how much we lend or give. At first it seems as if Luke is concerned only with money, and indeed he is so concerned, for he is always warning of the danger of possessions and the need to use them for those who have none. Luke is proclaiming Christ's Good News to a more affluent society than do Mark and Matthew, and places all the more emphasis on the danger of wealth. But, after dealing with money, Luke goes on to other acts of generosity. We must not judge, but must forgive in order to obtain forgiveness. Most of all, we must be compassionate. Whereas Matthew ends his instructions here with a general, 'Be perfect just as your heavenly Father is perfect', Luke focuses on compassion, 'Be sionate just as your Father is passionate.' It is an affair of the heart: we must be emotionally involved with those in need. Which is more portant, compassion or generosity?

could be something contemporary culture, or it could be the way of human beings, butit is very easy to live life as if it is a series of problems to be solved. 'If I can just deal with this, then everything will be fine. 'That seems to be the way of things, (until the next 'problem' comes along). And so when David is fleeing from Saul, and a sudden turn of events seems to offer a quick solution then Abishai wants David to seize it and solve the 'problem' of Saul. David rejects the solution, because he recognises that there is a bigger picture here. It is not just a question of dealing with this issue which presents itself now, it is about how does a person live in relation to God and the things of God. Saul is the 'the Lord's anointed' and so to strike him is to put oneself at odds with the Lord. Luke's great teaching in the Gospel for today (the 'Sermon on the Plain' - equivalent to Matthew's 'Sermon on the Mount') addresses the bigger picture in a formal way. The teaching which Jesus gives is very demanding and is very challenging to the way human beings might be expected to act: 'Do good to those who hate you', 'do not ask your property back from the man who robs you.' Jesus takes the line that David takes and extends it - if Saul is the Lord's anointed - then so is everyone. All are cherished and loved by God, and chosen as Saul was. When Jesus invites his disciples to 'Be compassionate as your Father is compassionate' he is asking them to see the bigger picture and live it - to see things as God does and live accordingly. That means avoiding any simple 'shorttermism' or living life as a series of problems which need 'solving'. It invites his hearers to see life as a whole, where everything is part of a whole - and that includes the life that we call eternal life where 'there will be gifts for you: a full measure, pressed down ... and running over.' To some extent what we are invited to become is, in the words of Paul in the second reading, like the new Adam. We are from the earth, but the invitation is to become as the second Adam - modelled on the heavenly man which is to become: 'compassionate as your Father is compassionate. '
